What does it mean to be a person of memory? Where does memory take us? Does what we remember hold us back or give us a lifeline? Or both? What is your most cherished memory? When you take the word “remember” apart, you get re-member—to put back together! At its best, then, memory helps us to re-assemble ourselves, to re-establish who we are and what we most want to be. At our November service we will have an opportunity to take part in a community ritual of honoring those who have died by remembering the gifts they have given us.

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Spirit in Practice Workshops

If you have ever wanted to find the right spiritual practice for you, or if you used to have a spiritual practice but let it go because it went hand-in-hand with religious beliefs that are no longer meaningful for you, or if you have a spiritual practice but would like to go deeper, this series of workshops might be just right for you! “Spirit in Practice” is a series of ten workshops that explores a variety of life-giving spiritual practices—where spirituality is defined as your relationship with the spirit of life, however you understand that. Topics include prayer and meditation, body movement, art and creativity, spiritual partnerships, justice practices, and so on.

We meet on the first and third Wednesday of each month, from 7 to about 8:30 or 9 p.m., at St. Luke’s Episcopal Church (side entrance, 14 State St). *You need not commit to regular attendance*—just dip in whenever you want for an opportunity to enhance the quality of your everyday life.

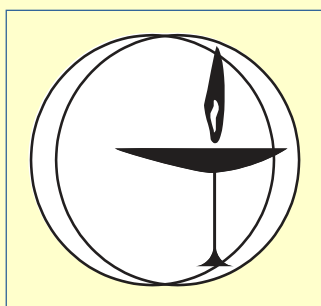
Soul Matters—Our Small Groups Program

Too often the pressures of our daily lives force us to move quickly from week to week, month to month, year to year. It can be hard to find the time to think or feel deeply about anything, let alone spiritual things. Soul Matters, our small groups program, is an opportunity to do just that, and to make important connections with other members in the process. We hope that Soul Matters will become a network of small groups within our congregation. The groups will meet monthly to discuss the worship theme of the month. Discussions will focus on listening and sharing about deep personal values, and will be led by trained facilitators from within the congregation.

For November, with the theme of memory, if you enroll in Soul Matters you will receive a small packet of readings related to the topic (four pages), and you will be invited to do three spiritual “exercises” in preparation for group discussion. First, re-connect with your earliest memory. It doesn’t have to be anything profound; just the earliest thing you can remember. Second, identify some memento that carries special meaning for you, and if it has gotten tucked away in a dusty closet, then find it and brush it off, and bring it to your Soul Matters group. Third, figure out a way to pass on some treasured memory. In group discussions, you will have a chance to talk about what this process was like. Did anything surprise you about it? Was it harder or easier than you expected? More painful or more fun?

Here’s one quote from the November readings, from William Faulkner: “The past is never dead, it is not even past.”

Social Justice Conference of the St. Lawrence Unitarian Universalist District: This conference will be held **November 7th**, 9:30 am to 4 pm, at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Amherst. The theme speaker is John Buehrens, former president of the Unitarian Universalist Association, on the topic “Doing Justice in an Economic Tsunami.” Further information is available at www.sld.uua.org, under Social Justice.

John Dominic Crossan, author of numerous books on the historical Jesus, will be the speaker at two events in Rochester. On **Sunday, November 8th**, at 5 p.m., he will speak on “Divine Violence in the Christian Bible” at St. Paul’s Episcopal Church, corner of East Avenue and Westminster Road. The talk will be preceded by Choral Evensong at 4 p.m. There is no charge for this event. On **Monday, November 9th**, he will speak at 2 p.m. at Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School, 1100 South Goodman, on “Jesus and the Kingdom of God.” There is a \$30 cost for this lecture. At 6 p.m. the same day there will be a reception and dinner with the keynote speech “Paul: An Appealing or Appalling Apostle.” The cost for the dinner is \$65. The cost for both the Monday afternoon lecture and the dinner is \$85.
